Haven to Home Canine Rescue looks forward to a new season with renewed enthusiasm, expanded outreach, and new fundraising ideas to help us save more lives here in the Susquehanna Valley. We welcome new volunteers with open arms and encourage dog loving people to get involved.

I'd like to give a big thanks to volunteer Shari Mngels for getting our new website up and running (which was no easy task). It is a data base website developed and powered by Rescue-Groups.org which helps us keep track of each dog and its status, all of our foster homes, our volunteers and our adoption applications. Way cool!

We continue to be without a "Home Base" and are still actively looking for a place to call home. We are looking for a small property with a decent yard. We need a place to store our supplies, have meetings, do trainings and quarantine a dog or two temporarily. We are also looking for financial backers to help make our dream come true.

New people have joined us to become foster families and that has helped us immensely in our endeavor to save dogs in need, and there are so many!! Foster families are the heart of our organization and we would not exist without them. We presently have 25 active foster families and three Boarding Kennels that help us: Aspen Hollow Kennel of Selinsgrove, Miller's Boarding Kennel of West Milton and Saltbox Kennel of Mifflinburg. I'd like to extend our sincere THANKS to these establishments for being there for us and especially for the dogs.

We are a successful rescue, boasting 60 adoptions since the New Year started. This takes hard work and dedication. I'd like to once again thank all of our frontline volunteers, who give up their free time to literally "save dogs" from abuse, neglect and abandonment. Way too many dogs suffer at the hands of humans. The animal welfare laws need to be improved and the ones in place need to be enforced.

MEDICATIONS

There are several common "people pills" that can be VERY toxic to dogs. It's important for dog owners to know what they are, so you can prevent any potential problems with your dog. The best advice we can give you is to NEVER give your dog a medication without the advice of your veterinarian. With that being said, for those of you that do give your pets medications OR if your pet accidentally gets into a medication, there are a few things you should know.

Toxic medications may include (depending on dose and frequency), **Ibuprofen (e.g. Advil)**, **Acetaminophen (e.g. Tylenol)** and **Aspirin**.

These are some things you may want to have on hand for your dog's medicine cabinet:

Hydrogen peroxide. Although most commonly thought of as a way to clean a wound, another important use is to induce vomiting when your dog has ingested toxins, foreign objects, drugs or spoiled food. However, check with your veterinarian first because there are times when it is best not to induce vomiting. Dogs won't drink peroxide willingly so buy an oral dose syringe or keep a turkey baster on hand to help administer the liquid. Also check the expiration date; expired peroxide is not as effective.

Benadryl® (diphenhydramine) is an antihistamine that is commonly used for itching and allergic reactions. Dogs that have had a bee sting, insect bite or vaccination reaction often need a dose of Benadryl® to calm itchiness, facial swelling or hives. The dose is based on your dog's weight, so check with your veterinarian; he or she can tell you how much Benadryl® you can give and how often.

Pepto-Bismol/Kaopectate—Every dog owner knows about vomiting, diarrhea and gas. Sometimes a dose of Pepto-Bismol or Kaopectate can solve a mild case of stomach or intestinal upset. **However**, Pepto-Bismol contains salicylates, the active ingredient in aspirin, so dogs that are aspirin sensitive should be given Kaopectate. Any vomiting or diarrhea that persists for more than 24 hours needs your veterinarian's attention. Be sure to mention if you have given any Pepto-Bismol to your dog; the tablet form of Pepto-Bismol looks just like a quarter on X-rays.

Triple Antibiotic Ointment—Topical antibacterial ointment is great for superficial wounds, such as cuts and scratches. It works best when the wound is located where the dog can't lick it since most dogs will lick off any salve you apply. It is not a good treatment for deep wounds, especially if they are dirty or bleeding, or the result of a bite. These need veterinary attention.

Isopropyl alcohol is often a good drying agent for ears. Many dogs that have recurring ear infections can use a solution of alcohol mixed with vinegar to dry up a wet ear. Alcohol should never be used in an ear that is inflamed or infected, or on a wound, as it burns when applied to damaged tissues. It can also be used in cases where your dog is overheated. Heat stroke is a life threatening situation that requires immediate veterinary attention, but alcohol applied to the pad of your dog's feet can provide some cooling while you are getting your pet to the vet.

FOSTER PROFILE—VANESSA ASKEY

In August 2008, I responded to an ad in the newspaper seeking foster homes for Haven to Home dogs. When I spoke to the Haven to Home foster coordinator by phone, she mentioned a black lab named Deuce who had been living alone in a shack for over three months. At the time, my family had two dogs of our own and we were keeping my Mom's dog; so my husband made it clear I was ONLY allowed to foster. I agreed. On August 24, 2008, we went out to where Deuce was living and we brought him home and renamed him Thomas. Long story short, two weeks after bringing this wonderful dog into our home, I was supposed to take him to an adoption event. I couldn't take him, so I told my husband that he would need to take him. He wouldn't do it either. In tears, I called Robin telling her someone would have to come pick him up because I couldn't take him...I didn't want to see him go. Well, Thomas, my first foster, has been a permanent part of my family since September of 2008. We didn't foster again for almost a year. I began working with a wonderful dog (some would call him a difficult dog) named Rocky who Stay N Play in Lewisburg was graciously holding for us. I ended up fostering Rocky. Teary eyed, six weeks later I said goodbye to him as he went to a wonderful home in Milton. After Rocky, came Nero (now Douglas), Denzel, Buddy and then Ranger. Ranger was a four-year old, starved lab mix who had spent his life on a chain. Ranger made me a little crazy the first few weeks. He would bark all night unless I slept with my hand in his crate. Even though he was four-years old, his development had stopped when he was chained as a puppy. Ranger had so many behavioral and psychological issues resulting from mistreatment before he was rescued. We went through a lot with Ranger in the three months he lived with us, but it was all worth it. I loved Ranger like he was my own. Giving him up left me crying for many, many days. Two weeks after he was adopted, I had the chance to go see him in his new home. His new Dad asked me if I was going to cry when I left that time. But I didn't cry. I could see that he has a great new life, is very happy, is well cared for and is being well loved. Don't get me wrong, Ranger is the dog I will always love and miss. But, if I wouldn't have given him up, I wouldn't have been able to help Rosie (now Sadie), Fiona, and Tina (my current foster puppy). Why do I foster? Because of dogs like Rocky and Ranger who really need someone to give them a lot of love and a little training while we search for their forever home!

When I meet a new foster family, I tell them the absolute hardest part of fostering is giving up the dog. Many tears will be shed and some dogs will seem almost impossible to give up. But, when you look back and see the difference you have made in these dogs' lives, it is definitely worth it.

P.S. I saw Nero/Douglas and Fiona at our Microchip clinic in April. Both dogs look fantastic and are doing wonderful. Douglas was hardly recognizable with his sleek black coat that was once brittle sunburned fur. Fiona has grown quite a bit in the last few months. Denzel is enjoying his new life with lots of love and freedom and Buddy loves his daily hikes with his new family.

SKIN AND COAT CARE

Eggs make coats shine. A weekly scrambled egg added to your cat or dog's food helps keep her coat shiny, and it's a healthy treat your pet will love. Raw eggs are off limits, of course, because they could be contaminated with salmonella.

Mouthwash for skin problems. Mouthwashes are a good all-around disinfectant for your dog or cat. Use one of the stronger mouthwash brands as an astringent on your pet's skin to disinfect wounds, clean cuts and scrapes and cool down boils and other hot spots. Just moisten a cotton ball with mouthwash and dab it on the affected area to help a banged-up dog or cat heal more quickly.

Go bananas! Add about a third of a soft banana to 1 1/2 cups dry food. Slice it, mash it and stir it into the pellets. Not only does it add variety and a bit of healthy sweetness, but a bit of banana also will settle your dog's stomach.

MEET TYSON AND DUKE!

Tyson and Duke are 9 month old twin collie/german shepherd mixes. They are living with a family who rescued them from a breeder who was ready to destroy them because they were not purebred collies. They are very friendly, good with kids, other dogs and love attention from everyone! They even like to play with the cat in the house.

They are crate-trained and housebroken, but like a typical puppy if they are not supervised, they can get into trouble.

They were separated once for a few days but were not very happy as they did a lot of moping and looking for each other even though there were other dogs in the house to keep them company. A home where they can be kept together would be best. With some exercise, training and affection, these two will show you the best of both breeds. They will be neutered and vetted before they go to their forever home.



BREAK THE HABIT OF JUMPING

Dogs jump on people for a variety of reasons. They want attention. They want to be closer to you and jumping gets their face close to your face. It can be a very pushy friendliness. And it can be a dominance gesture. But this can hurt a child, or an elderly person during the collision.

If you push a dog away, he is being rewarded by getting

your hands on him. If you yell "get down," that also is attention. To discourage jumping, ignore your dog, also turn your back, or walk away when he jumps. This removes the reward and incentive and prevents jumping from being a successful behavior.

When a dog sits, praise him or give him a treat. Withhold all attention (even eye con-

tact, or speaking), until all four paws are on the ground. Ask visitors to pet your dog only when he sits. This teaches your dog to associate good things: attention, praise, treats with sitting.

There's no quick and easy cure. Be consistent.
